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Surefire Summer Shows in Art World Hot Spots

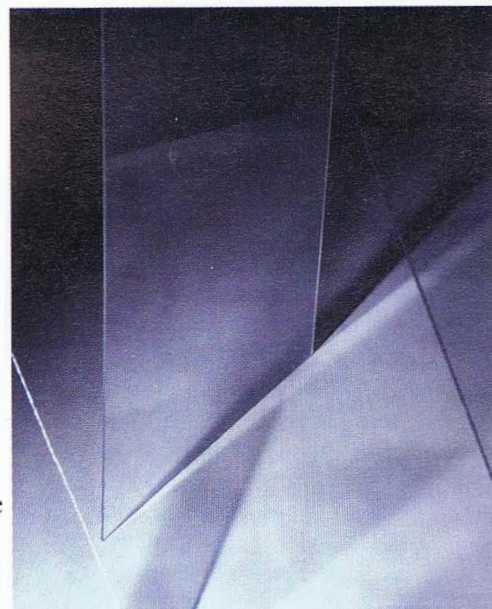
BARBARA KASTEN AND JUSTIN BEAL: CONSTRUCTS, ABRASIONS, MELONS AND CUCUMBERS

Stefania Bortolami mixes it up with exhibitions of two artists who push at the boundaries of their chosen fields: photographer Barbara Kasten and sculptor Justin Beal. Kasten, who has long experimented with various forms of abstract and cameraless photography as well as wide-ranging printing techniques including cyanotypes and archival pigment prints, will get the survey treatment with examples spanning 1975 to 2012. There will be several pieces from her "Studio Constructs" series, in which she photographs assemblages made from glass, mirrors, wire, and sheet metal to create an illusory space, including the 50-by-40-inch *Studio Construct 121*, 2011, below.

Beal, a 2001 Yale graduate, continues his subtle critique of modernist architecture and design and consumer culture through metal sculptures, including cast-aluminum cucumbers and cantaloupes, and wall sculptures in which architectural elements like poles and shelves are masked in matte urethane rubber.

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
